6th Sunday of Easter JN 14:23-29

T

he concept of hospitality is fundamental to a discipleship way of life. When we envision hospitality, we naturally think of offering a sincere and warm welcome — to those new to our parish, for instance. We picture inviting them in and making them feel at home and at ease in our presence, communicating to

them that they are highly valued. Today's Gospel reading from John invites us to think of hospitality in a slightly different way. In it, we hear Jesus speaking this to his disciples: "Whoever loves me will keep my word,

and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him."

Jesus is asking that we permit the Blessed Trinity to come and dwell within us. This is a stunning request. It tells us that our first and most privileged form of hospitality should be directed towards God Himself. How does one show hospitality to God? How do we make God "at home and at ease" within us? How can we communicate to God that He is "highly valued" by us? Jesus tells us how: we are to keep His word, to follow His teachings. In order to keep His word, we must know His word. This takes discipline and effort on our part. We must make study of Scripture and Church teaching a priority in our daily lives. This can be done in small and simple

ways. Perhaps you can commit to setting your alarm 10 minutes early to meditate on the day's Gospel. Perhaps you could read a paragraph of the Catechism with your family at dinner. You could pray over a portion of the Psalms before going to bed at night. You can join (or start!) a Bible study right here at our parish. There are many ways to grow in knowledge and love of God's word.



Over time, these simple practices can radically change one's life. We will begin to more easily think like Jesus, respond like Jesus, and live like Jesus. We really will form our minds, hearts and souls into a place where the Blessed Trinity is pleased to dwell.

How is this possible? Because we have an Unseen Teacher with us as we seek to know and keep God's word. Later, in this same Gospel passage, Jesus tells us so: "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you." Ask the Holy Spirit to show you when and how you can get to know God's word in your particular circumstances and then commit to it!

If we want our parish to be a place of genuine Christian hospitality, we must be sure that our own hearts are hospitable dwelling places for the Blessed Trinity. Then, our smiles and words, our greetings and ministries, will radiate with the warmth of God's love. And, our parish family will become at least a little bit like Heaven on earth. This is the simplicity and glory of the discipleships' way of life.







SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Augustine of Canterbury, Bishop




St. Augustine, born in the first third of the sixth century, was a Benedictine monk and was named the first archbishop of Canterbury in 598. He was prior of a monastery in Rome when St. Gregory the Great, after seeing blonde Saxon slaves in the market, chose him to lead a mission to England. Augustine worked in Kent in the south of England, and once he converted King AEthelberht, the rest of Kent followed. He died in 604 and was buried in the abbey church at Canterbury, which became a place of pilgrimage. The shrine was destroyed and the relics were lost during the English Reformation.

JUNE ALNAJJAR

Where did you grow up? Tell us a little about your background.

I grew up in Burlington, Vermont, a university town on Lake Champlain. I was the youngest of five children. My Dad, the oldest of nine was brought up Catholic by his native American grandmother and french grandfather. My French mom became Catholic when she was a teenager, and her excitement for the faith was contagious. As a family, we went to church regularly. Holiday traditions were very important to my mom, and she made every holy day special. I can remember how challenging it was for me, though, not to say a word on Good Friday afternoons from 1-3 pm, a Catholic custom back then. One of my fondest memories of my childhood years was seeing my mom and dad get down on their knees every night to pray. My faith blossomed because of the experiences I had at home.

Looking back, one of the greatest gifts I received was attending Catholic school for both my grammar and high school years. After I graduated from business college, I went to Washington D.C. to work for a couple of years. Although it was very exciting to meet girls from all over the United States, I eventually became lonesome for my home and my sister's growing family. I told my parents, "I'm done being adventurous!" A

job with the CIA sounded exciting, but my heart wasn't really in it.

About six months after returning to Vermont, I met Mikhail at a St. Michael's College basketball game (the college he attended). After halftime, this cute guy sat on the bench right in front of me and kept asking me questions about the players. Unbeknownst to my Dad, who was also in attendance, I gave Mikhail my phone number before leaving that night. Forty-one years later I am still married to my dearest friend.

During our courting years I drove a new Chevrolet Camaro, and I remember my mom sitting Mikhail down one day asking: "You're not just dating my daughter for her car... are you?" To say the least, I felt embarrassed! We waited to get married until his last year of college. My parents thought we were too young, but my Dad said, "Well, if you can show me a budget and prove to me that the two of you can make it financially, you can get married." So we did!

How did we make ends meet? I'm not really sure, but I do know God was with us. To earn extra money, I typed many of Mikhail's friends' graduate papers on an electric typewriter. It was crazy, but we were young and loved being together, even if money was tight. We had our first two children while Mikhail was still in Graduate school. Crazy I know! We pinched pennies and lived in a tiny place. During the day, I went to work and he stayed home with our first child, and did his studies and writing while she napped. When I arrived home, he would to go off to night school. We improvised and had a great time, even in the midst of all the chaos. One time squirrels broke through our suspended ceiling right before Christmas! They knocked over our tree, and our kitchen was a total disaster! One of Mikhail's science professors offered to come over and set traps! My advice for young couples today is, "just laugh yourself through the little setbacks life brings."

How did you balance working, church, and family life?

By the grace of God! Our generous Heavenly Father put people in our lives at just the right time, and with His help, we found a way to do it all. Family was the most important thing to both of us, and we tried to live our faith in action for our kids. While our three children were all still under the age of thirteen, we decided as a family to become foster parents. The first child we took in was a 16-year-old pregnant Black-Hispanic girl. We were always very pro-life, and we wanted to do something concrete to show our kids we really meant it. She stayed with us, delivered her baby, and decided to keep her baby. She was so strong and determined, and eventually reconciled with her own mom and returned home.

A few years later we took in an 11-year-old Korean girl as well as a 7-year-old Hispanic boy who had both experienced rough lives. It was never easy, but it was good to be able to help. I know that time spent with our foster children made our own kids want to help otherstruggling kids in their future careers. Our oldest daughter is now a psychologist and school counselor for junior high kids that are incarcerated. Our son works with youth at the YMCA, and our youngest is a director of her division in public health.

MAY 26, 2019 SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

Sure, there were times when all the activities we were involved with were overwhelming, but we felt so strong as a family, and we wanted to do it. Fostering was not only good for the kids we were helping, but also good for our own family. When you're being asked to do more by God and you say "yes," you receive so much more in return. We were blessed 100 times over for opening up our home and lives to God's unexpected plans for us.

What brought you to Gig Harbor?

Our children and grandchildren all currently live on this side of the Cascades, so as soon as Mikhail retired, our kids sent us on a bed-and-breakfast tour of the Peninsula and Puget Sound. The pressure was on to find the best place for us to settle; finding the right church was the most important thing to us. So, we attended Mass at several churches in the area.

Then we came to St. Nicholas. After Mass, I looked at Mikhail and said, "Honey, I think this is it." What I noticed right away was the reverence of the people here. It was tangible. That was it; it was an easy transition after that. I tell everybody I meet, "One year ago, we had never even heard of Gig Harbor, and now it is our beloved home.

Do you have any favorite saints?

My favorite saint is St. Maria Goretti. I could never figure out as a young person how she could be as strong and brave as she was to try fight off her assailant. I wanted to be that holy, that strong. I was in awe of her, and aspired to be like her. I took her name as my confirmation name, and have always felt close to her.

What are some things you do to keep your faith alive?

Back when I was a young mom, I remember getting the Liguorian magazine in the mail. I would read it from cover to cover as soon as it arrived. Taking time for spiritual reading continues to feed my faith. I love learning, and I love reading Scripture. I also like taking time out for retreats. When we first started making retreats together as a couple, I loved it. Any time I could be alone with Mikhail for a few days was heaven for me! We eventually lead marriage retreats in the Yakima Diocese for about 7 years. We learned a lot about priests when we were leading retreats, and would invite them over to our house often. They also accompanied us on Marriage Encounter family camping trips, where they would say Mass for all of us outdoors. Our kids were really blessed by that. Some of our best conversations with priests took place in informal settings like this, sitting around a campfire together.

Do you have a favorite Bible verse?


After one of our marriage encounter retreats, a couple gave us a beautiful framed picture for our home of an open Bible with a beautiful rose laid against it. It reads, "Love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34) This picture was very meaningful when we received it, and it still means the world to us.

How do you like to spend your time?

I love people. And I love coffee. Back in the Tri-Cities, six girlfriends and I "belonged" to a coffee lovers group. We met years ago in a popular saints class at our parish. Studying a saint of our choosing for an entire year allowed our group to really delve deeply into the life of the saint, their writings, and what other people wrote about them. And, of course, as women do, we also talked about everything else going on in our lives, and how each of us related to the saint. Over the years, we also attended retreats and vacationed together. What a blessing this group of strong women has been in my life.

Do you have any special devotions?

From the time I was a little girl, I loved our family bible. Ours sat in our living room on the coffee table, and I picked it up often to study all the pictures of the Holy Land and read the beautiful stories. But never in my wildest imagination did I ever picture myself there. When an opportunity arose for me to go for a visit a few years ago, I was in a "kind of a daze" until we boarded our plane in Seattle for Tel Aviv. On the long flight, I pinched myself often to make sure it was truly happening, and I wasn't dreaming it all up! My experiences in Holy Land were extraordinary. It is really hard to describe to someone who has never been how amazing it is. Walking on the path where Jesus traveled was overwhelming, and riding on a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee with the wind in my face was a total "mind blower" for me. 
